## **March 11-19, 2006: Float, Drag, Hike Dirty Devil**

This will be a committing and sometimes arduous 7-day journey through a fairyland of spectacular and seldom-visited canyons up to 2000' deep in one of the most remote locations in the lower 48. We'll launch on the aptly named Dirty Devil River near Hanksville, Utah and exit 80 miles downriver near Hite. Because of the shallow depth and difficulty in determining the deepest water, small, quality boats (little rafts, IKs, or canoes) are required. We will be dragging the boats at least some of the time for the first 2/3 days. Current, but no rapids, except the last 0.5 mile, where a steep channel (avoidable) has been cut through the silt/sand deposited when Lake Powell was 200' higher. Wetsuits required. Daytime avg highs/lows are 60/29. The river is merely the conduit to the best part of the trip – hiking in the side canyons: towering cliffs, waterfalls, ruins, caves, hoodoos, glyphs, and slots await us. Many of the canyons are boxed and only accessible from the Dirty Devil. For more details or to sign up, contact Mike or Debbie Allen at 208.384.1545 (Boise). Participation limited to permit size. Note: This trip announcement is not an IAC sponsored trip but Debbie and Mike may still have room on the permit for anyone interested in participating.

### Adopt-A-Trail Opportunity

Dave Woodcock from the Palisades Ranger District of the Caribou-Targhee National Forest attended the January council meeting and provided a list non-motorized trails in the Palisades Ranger District that need to be adopted.

Trail users often take this resource for granted until the paths become impassable, unsightly or damaged. Then, perhaps only then, do we realize that trails are essential and without them many of our most enjoyable activities are not possible.

With decreased funding for trail maintenance and increased use, many of our trails are not getting the attention they need. You can help by "adopting" your favorite trail in the National Forest and taking responsibility for its upkeep.

Adopters can be any age. You can participate as an individual, a family, a club or an office group. All it takes is willingness to get out and work on your trail and have fun accomplishing this needed work too. Work at your own pace and on your own schedule. Generally, it is best to maintain trails in the early spring so they are ready for the hiking season.

So, please come to the March meeting, review the maps showing the location of trails and pick a trail or several that you will work to maintain. You can even adopt a portion of a trail since a few are quite long. The work involves clearing the trail of downfall, loose rocks, weeds, brush and encroaching branches at least once during the year, preferably in the spring after the snow is gone. More information on the program will be available at the meeting.

Editor's Note: Adopting a trail, whether your preference is non-motorized or motorized, is a great way to give back to the outdoors which we enjoy. Many club members have been maintaining trails through the Adopt-A-Trail program for years. If you don't want to commit to adopting a trail for a year, National Trails Days Events are a fun opportunity to try it out and get stoked to adopt a trail of your own.
