## Eagles win tourney in Idaho Falls

Entering the shootout, Idaho Falls sophomore Devan Davis was so nervous that coach Brian Latham took him out of the first five shooters.

But when Idaho Falls and Ogden remained tied at two after five shooters, Davis found himself at center ice.

"I was surprised they picked me," Davis said. "I'm just a sophomore."

Davis faked to Ogden goalie Max LaRoque's glove side, then deked to his backhand and the shot, after ricocheting off LaRoque's stick, found the back of the net to break a 1-1 tie and give his team the title at the Midget AA Tin Can Classic Tournament at Tautphaus Park.

"I knew their goalie was strong on his glove side, so I faked to his glove, got him to slide over and went back the other way," Davis said. "It was the best feeling I've ever had in hockey."

The Idaho Falls Eagles were in survival mode most of the game after Ogden, which beat Idaho Falls 4-0 on Saturday night, opened the scoring with a Bronson Taylor power-play goal in the first period.

Idaho Falls drew even in the third period when Don MacLachlan flicked a low-angle shot at the net from below the face-off circle. LaRoque made the easy save, but the rebound bounced up in the air and hit an Ogden defender in the back, bouncing in for a short-handed goal.

"I figured if we could get it to a shootout, we'd have a chance," Latham said. "That's the toughest team we've played all year."

Ogden led the shootout 2-1 when Idaho Falls, which shot second, sent Jake Johnson out as its last shooter for a must-have goal.

Johnson skated straight down the ice, faked a wrist shot then went between LaRoque's legs to send the game into a sudden-death shootout, setting up Davis' game-winner.

"I knew it all depended on if I made that shot," Johnson said. "If I missed, we lose. Earlier in the game I had a break away and tried the same move and he stopped it. But I knew I could make it."
